OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS WASHINGTON COUNTY BOARD MEETING

October 14, 2025

The reconvened and adjourned meeting of the County Board of Washington County, Illinois was held at the Washington County Courthouse Nashville, Illinois on Tuesday, October 14, 2025 for the purpose of transacting county business that might come before the Board.

Present and presiding were Chairman David Meyer and Donna Johannes, Deputy Clerk and Deputy Clerk of the Board.

Roll Call was taken by Deputy Clerk Johannes with 11 members present. Those present were, Brammeier, Hohlt, Ibendahl, Shemonic, Small, Unverfehrt, Todd, Luna-Fuller, Karg, Elsesser, and Meyer. Absent was Klingenberg, Bening, Bronke and Malick.

Others present were Crystal May-State's Attorney, Matt Bierman – EMA and Zoning, Kiefer Heiman-Highway Superintendent, Sheriff Schultze, Chief Deputy Carroll, Deputy Howard, John Felchlia-Ambulance Administrator, Carl Adams, Jeff Twardowski, Matt Kasten, Deb Hagopian and Todd Marver-Washington County News

Following the Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance, Chairman Meyer called the meeting of the Washington County Board to order at 7:04 p.m. Malick entered the meeting at 7:05.

Chairman Meyer asked if there were any additions or corrections to the September 9, 2025 Board meeting minutes. With no additions or corrections, a motion was made by Elsesser to approve the minutes, seconded by Shemonic. Motion carried. Chairman Meyer asked if there were additions or corrections to the September 29, 2025 Special Board meeting minutes. With no additions or corrections, a motion was made by Karg to approve the minutes, seconded by Brammeier. Motion carried. Bening entered the meeting at 7:06.

Public's comments: Matt Kasten, Superintendent, Veterans' Assistance Commission, introduced himself to the Board, said he was getting settled in and would be doing on-line training soon.

Deb Hagopian, Animal Control Warden addressed the board. Jay Colbrook apologizes he was unable to attend. Hagopian said at the end of last year they had 359 rescues, and they are on pace to do the same this year if not more. New kennels are fantastic and would like to get more. The biggest problem now are the mice. Shemonic handed out a letter that Colbrook wanted presented to the board addressing his concerns with the facility. **(Exhibit A)**

The County Clerk and Recorder's Monthly Report (Exhibit B) Deputy Clerk Johannes presented the monthly report to the Board for approval a motion was made by Hohlt seconded by Small to approve the report as presented. Motion carried. Johannes reminded board members who will be running for office in 2026 that the petition filing period is October 27 – November 3, 2025.

Dr. Jay Colbrook, D.V.M. Washington County Animal Control Administrator October 7, 2025

To the Washington County Board Members:

Good evening, and please accept my regrets for not being able to attend in person. Thank you for still allowing me the opportunity to address the board.

I have been associated with Washington County Animal Control for the past fifty years. I first worked with Dr. J.L. Box, and when he retired as the Washington County Animal Control Administrator, I took over his position. Throughout this time, Washington County Animal Control and the Board have maintained an excellent working relationship, and I deeply appreciate your ongoing support.

The citizens of Washington County have always been generous with their time, money, and help. Groups such as Partners for Pets have enabled us to save countless animals over the years. Our present warden, Deb Hagopian, is truly irreplaceable—and underpaid for the incredible work she does.

However, the main topic I wish to address tonight is our facility itself. It is, quite frankly, beyond repair—shot, kaputt, no longer a viable option. Members of the board have heard and seen the many problems firsthand. The building is undersized and poorly designed for our current animal population. Rodents have taken over, and even the Illinois Department of Agriculture has expressed serious concerns. In short, we need a new facility—pronto.

I am asking for the Board's approval to move forward with plans for a new animal control facility and to select a suitable site. Once a location is approved, we can begin designing a financially responsible and practical building.

My recommendation is to use our current lot, only set farther back on the property. The site is already known to the public, easily accessible, and provides the best safety and logistical advantages for our staff and animals. We are located near the State Transportation Department and other businesses, and we benefit from city and county police protection, as well as proximity to fire, ambulance, and hospital services. With thoughtful planning, the property can continue to serve both us and the county effectively.





BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the attorneys employed by the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor are hereby authorized to act as Assistant State's Attorneys on behalf of the State's Attorney of this County in the appeal of all cases when requested to do so by the State's Attorney, and with the advice and consent of the State's Attorney, prepare, file, and argue appellate briefs for those cases; and also, as may be requested by the State's Attorney, to assist in the prosecution of cases under the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, the Cannabis Control Act, the Drug Asset Forfeiture Procedure Act, and the Narcotics Profit Forfeiture Act. Such attorneys are further authorized to assist the State's Attorney in the trial and appeal of tax objections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor will offer Continuing Legal Education training programs to the State's Attorneys and Assistant State's Attorneys.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the attorneys employed by the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor may also assist the State's Attorney of this County in the discharge of the State's Attorney's duties in the prosecution and trial of other cases, and may act as Special Prosecutor if duly appointed to do so by a court having jurisdiction.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor is duly appointed to act as a Special Prosecutor in this County by a court having jurisdiction, this County will provide reasonable and necessary clerical and administrative support and victim-witness coordination on an as-needed basis and will also cover all reasonable and necessary case expenses such as expert witness fees, transcripts, evidence presentation, documents, lodgings, and all other expenses directly related to the prosecution of the case.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board hereby agrees to participate in the service program of the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor, commencing December 1, 2025 and ending November 30, 2026, by hereby appropriating the sum of \$7,500 as consideration for the express purpose of providing a portion of the funds required for financing the operation of the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor, and agrees to deliver the same to the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor on request during the stated twelve month period.

Presentation by Pattern Energy on the Kaskaskia Renewables Energy Project in Washington County at Original Springs, Okawville, IL @ 6:30 pm.

Diogo Botelho introduced himself and his team to the board and gave an overview and development update of the proposed Pattern Energy Kaskaskia Renewables energy project.

Diogo Botelho started by highlighting how Pattern Energy develops, constructs, owns, and operates high-quality wind, solar, transmission, and energy storage projects across North America. Pattern is focused on building reliable infrastructure to meet America's critical electricity demand. Pattern has multiple projects under development in Illinois.

The Kaskaskia project represents an almost \$1 billion private investment in the county. The project is a mix of wind and solar.

During the construction phase projected for 2028, 300 or more construction jobs will be created. Once operational, Pattern estimates that 30 or more permanent jobs will be created. Pattern strives to hire locally for these positions.

At this stage of the project, Pattern is focused on concluding the land campaign by working with private landowners to sign development leases. Pattern has more that 80% of the land required under contract, and the remaining is under negotiation. Partnerships with private landowners drive the project's footprint and layout, which are not fully defined yet.

Pattern is expecting the project operational date in late 2029/30.


Pattern works with landowners to continue agricultural use with minimal impact, adhering to the already signed Illinois Renewable Energy Facilities Agriculture Impact Mitigation Act (AIMA) agreement to ensure that agricultural land is protected and restored during and after the construction of large-scale renewable energy projects.

Pattern noted that U.S. electricity demand is expected to grow significantly in the coming years, mainly due to electrification and data centers, increasing the project's value for Washington County.

During discussions, David asked how the potential closure or reduction of Prairie State generation, or other power plants in the region, impacts renewable sector interest in the area and if that was a consideration in Pattern's interest in the region. Mr. Botelho responded that Pattern assessed interconnection suitability across the region, but not specifically power plant retirements, and those are not considered part of the project's viability. David also questioned how Pattern's proposed project will interact with mineral leasing. Mr. Botelho mentioned that Pattern has identified areas of concern and shifted from those that were timely.





Will the wind and solar projects be developed on the same land?

No, the solar project will be developed on separate land from the wind project. They will not coexist in the same location.

Why do turbines have to be placed on farmland? Could I still farm?

While turbines don't necessarily need to be placed on farmland, its characteristics often make it an ideal location for energy generation. Though installing renewables may briefly affect local agriculture, there are long-term benefits, such as diversified income streams for farmers, that outweigh these shorter-term disruptions.

Landowners can maintain farming and ranching alongside wind projects with minimal impact on farmland. Each turbine typically requires just one acre of land post-construction. We are committed to collaborating with farmers when siting wind turbines to minimize disruption to their operations.

Why do turbines have to be placed on farmland? Could I still farm?

Although Pattern's renewable projects may seem expansive, the actual amount of farmland used for the project is minimal and unlikely to impact land prices. This Law Enforcement Mutual Aid Agreement between the WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF; the NASHVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT and the OKAWVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Parties") applies when the Parties, from time to time, need the assistance of each other with the performance of their Constitutional and statutory duties.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article VII, Section 4(b) of the Illinois Constitution, a Sheriffs' a constitutional officer of their county; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3-6021 of the Counties Code, a Sheriff is the "Conservator of the Peace" of their county; and

WHEREAS, as Conservator of the Peace, the Sheriff is required by Section 3-6021 of the Counties Code to "prevent crime and maintain the safety and order of the citizens of that county"; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3-6035 of the Counties Code, a Sheriff is the "Supervisor of Safety" of their county; and

WHEREAS, as Supervisor of Safety, a Sheriff is required by Section 3-6036 of the Counties Code to "enforce all the laws of this State"; and

WHEREAS, as Supervisor of Safety, a Sheriff is required by Section 3-6036 of the Counties Code to, within the municipalities in their county, enforce ordinances "relating to the regulation of motor vehicle traffic and the promotion of safety on public highways"; and

WHEREAS, there is extensive illegal trafficking of narcotics, controlled substances, and dangerous drugs on the public highways in Washington County], and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3-6022 of the Counties Code, a Sheriff may call to their aid, when necessary, any person or the power of the county to "keep the peace and prevent crime" in their County; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff of Washington County, the Nashville Police Department and the Okawville Police Department do not individually have adequate resources to prevent illegal trafficking of narcotics, controlled substances, and dangerous drugs in on the public highways in their respective counties; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff of Washington County, the Nashville Police and the Okawville Police Department need the aid of each other to prevent crime, maintain safety and order, and keep the peace regarding the illegal trafficking of narcotics, controlled substances, and dangerous drugs in on the public highways in their respective jurisdictions;

WHEREAS, the Sheriff of Washington County, the Nashville Police Department, and the Okawville Police Department each desire to have an Agreement in how said aid will be provided

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings and covenants herein contained, the Sheriff of Washington County, the Nashville Police Department, and the Okawville Police Department hereby stipulate and agree as follows:

Section 1 -Definitions:

For the purpose of this Mutual Aid Agreement, the following definitions shall apply:

(a) Requesting Sheriff

"Requesting Sheriff' shall be defined as the Sheriff of the undersigned County that is requesting mutual aid and/or assistance from the police department of the undersigned Jurisdiction(s)

(b) Responding Police Department

"Responding Police Department" shall be defined as any one of the undersigned Police Departments that has agreed to provide mutual aid and/or assistance to a Requesting Sheriff or Police Department under the terms of this Agreement.

Section 2 -Requests for Aid

- (a) Requests for Mutual Aid under this Agreement will be initiated only when the needs of the requesting Sheriff or Police Department exceed the resources of the requesting Sheriff's Office or Police Department.
- (b) As soon as the Requesting Sheriff or Police Department is able to satisfactorily handle the situation with its own resources, the Responding Sheriffs' or Police Departments resources will be released and returned to their own respective Sheriff's Office or Police Departments.
- (c) If a Responding Sheriff's Office or Police Department(s) decides to recall its assistance pursuant to Section 4 of this Agreement, the Requesting Sheriff or Chief of Police shall release the resources of the responding Sheriff's Office or Police Department(s) to their own respective Sheriff's Office or Police Department(s).

Section 3 - Response to Requests for Aid

- (a) The Parties to this Agreement agree that, upon the request from any one of the undersigned Sheriffs or Chief ('s) of Police, they will respond with such law enforcement personnel, equipment, resources, facilities, or services as are, in the opinion of the Responding Sheriff or Chiefs of Police, available, useful, and being requested by the Requesting Sheriff or Chief ('s) of Police.
- (b) Possible responses include, but are not limited to:
 - (i) Being on standby;
 - (ii) Providing the benefit of prior experience or consultation; and/or
 - (iii) Active actual participation in law enforcement activities in the jurisdiction of the Requesting Sheriff.
- (c) Any of the levels of participation in subsection (b) may also include the provision of equipment, resources, facilities, or other services.

Section 4 - Limitations on Assistance

Each Responding Sheriff or Chief of Police reserves the right to refuse to render assistance, limit the assistance rendered, or to recall any or all rendered assistance, whenever the responding Sheriff or Chief of Police believe that such refusal, limitation, or recall is necessary to ensure adequate protection of its own Jurisdiction.

Section 5 - Supervision

- (a) The Requesting Sheriff's Office or Chief of Police shall be in command of the operations at the scene.
- (b) Law Enforcement Personnel from the Responding Sheriff's Office or Police Department shall report to, and shall work under, the direction and supervision of the Requesting Sheriff or Chief of Police.
- (c) At all times, the personnel of the Responding Sheriff or Chief of Police shall remain employees of their respective Jurisdiction and shall adhere to the policies and procedures of their own Sheriff's Office or Police Department. While working under the direction of the Requesting Sheriff, law enforcement personnel shall only be required to respond to lawful orders.

Section 6 - Insurance, Indemnification, and Employee Benefits

Each Sheriff's Office or Police Department shall be responsible for providing personnel benefits, including benefits that arise due to injury or death, to .their own employees as required by State or Federal law just as if the employee would have been working as an employee in their County.

Section 7 - Damage to Equipment

Each Responding Sheriff or Police Department shall also be responsible, regardless of fault, for replacing or repairing any damage to its own vehicles or equipment that occurs while providing assistance under this Agreement.

Section 8 - Liability

- (a) Each Sheriff's Office and Police department shall be responsible for insuring or indemnifying its own employees, as provided by State and/or Federal law.
- (b) The Requesting Sheriff agrees that this Agreement shall not give rise to any liability or responsibility for the failure of any other signatory Chief of Police to respond to any request for assistance made pursuant to this Agreement.
- (c) Each Responding Sheriff and Chief of Police under this Agreement further agrees that each Responding Sheriff will be responsible for defending itself in any action or dispute that arises in connection with, or as the result of, this Agreement and that each Responding Sheriff and Chief of Police will be responsible for bearing their own costs, damages, losses, expenses and attorney fees;

Section 9 - No Third-Party Beneficiary

The Parties expressly agree that this Agreement and its provisions are for the benefit of the Parties in carrying out their respective constitutional and statutory responsibilities as Sheriff and Chief of Police of their respective jurisdictions and it shall not be considered or construed to be for the benefit of any third party or to create any right in any third party.

Section 10 - Paragraph Headings

The captions and headings used in this Mutual Aid Agreement are only for convenience of reference and the organization of this Agreement and shall not be construed as expanding, defining, or limiting the terms and provisions in this Agreement.

Section 11 - Severability

If any provision of this Agreement is found unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the Parties agree that remaining terms and provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect and shall in no way be affected, impaired, or invalidated.

Section 12 -Amendments

This Agreement may not be modified except by a written document that is signed by the Parties.

Section 13 - Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by, construed, interpreted, and enforced in all respects in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois, without regard to conflict of law principles, and whenever possible, each provision herein shall be interpreted in such manner as to be effective or valid under applicable law.

Section 14 - Entire Agreement

The Parties acknowledge that the terms and conditions as set forth herein constitute the entire agreement amongst them, and that there are no matters agreed to amongst them that are not set forth herein.

Section 15 -Termination of Agreement

This Mutual Aid Agreement may be terminated at any time by written notice of the Sheriff or Police Chief wishing to terminate this Mutual Aid Agreement to all agencies that are a Party to this Agreement.

Section 16-Signatures

The Parties agree that this Agreement may be signed in counterparts with the same effect as if the signatures were upon the same document. Signatures obtained via facsimile or other electronic means shall be deemed the same as originals.
